Celebrating the Spirit of the Machine!



Stan Reynolds inherited a love of collecting from his father. Some of his artifacts were acquired through trade-ins at his car dealership, but most he searched out himself, soon to amass a very large collection of mechanical equipment from various periods in Canadian history. In order to preserve his collection, he agreed to donate a large portion of it to the province of Alberta in exchange for a facility to house these items. After much planning, the museum opened its doors on September 12, 1992.

Reynolds-Alberta Museum is a project of Alberta Community Development and Alberta Infrastructure and is provincially owned and operated. It focuses on Alberta's mechanized history, with four themes being transportation, agriculture, aviation and industry. Many of our artifacts are quite rare and irreplaceable. We presently have more than 8000 artifacts in our collection. The main exhibit gallery contains only a sample; the rest are on the grounds or stored in our warehouse. Reynolds-Alberta Museum celebrates the spirit of the machine through lively interr pretation of an outstanding collection of vehicles, aircraft, tractors and industrial machines. Our stories begin in the 1880s and tell how these amazing machines shaped the lives of ordinary and extraordinary people.

In this DVD boxed set, *Wings Over Canada* pilot Darren Adam and automotive expert Corrie Miller (from *The New Driver's Seat*) take us on the grand tour, exammining everything from airplanes and helicopters to cars, trucks and agricultural equipment. Watching these three shows can not only teach you about the passions of a great machine collector (Stan Reynolds) but more than a century of Canadian history from a technical perspective.
